### The Huntington Shoot by Bob Cameron

This outing to the Huntington estate will give participants an opportunity to photograph the estate's world-class gardens, art galleries, mansion and library. Participants who plan to carpool should rendezvous at 8:30



a.m. in the Batiquitos Park and Ride parking lot. This parking lot is near the intersection of La Costa Avenue and Highway 5. Maps and directions will be handed out at the start of the trip. There are several issues, such as lunch reservations, that must be addressed before the outing, so please contact the leader via e-mail (rcamero3@san.rr.com) and/or by telephone (858-456-3862). At that time, important information will given to those who wish to drive separately, as well as to those who plan to carpool. The admission fee for the Huntington is \$12.50 for adults and \$10.00 for seniors age 65+. It is the Huntington policy that cameras and tripods are

allowed throughout the gardens but tripods and flash cannot be used for photos taken inside the art galleries, mansion or other buildings. The minimum number of participants is four (including leader) and these four participants will ride in the leader's automobile. The Huntington is about 100 miles from Batiquitos Park and Ride and the trip will take about 2 hours. Since the Huntington opens at 10:30 a.m., we should arrive near opening time.

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### San Diego County Fair, by Ed Stalder

On June 11, 2004, the San Diego County Fair will open at the county fairgrounds in Del Mar. Donna Cosentino, Coordinator for the International Exhibition of Photography, has again requested our assistance. This, in turn, gives us the opportunity to make a few dollars for the club, while providing participating members the opportunity for personal involvement in the workings of a major photographic exhibition.

We have been asked to provide help with photo take-in and judging. Photo take-in will take place on Wednesday, May 26, and Thursday, May 27, from 11:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m. both days. This job requires the volunteer to remain on duty for the total number of hours indicated above, thus avoiding training people while receiving exhibits. This job involves checking the prints against the entry form, assuring they are mounted properly, and attaching labels. During the judging, which will take place on Monday, May 31, from 8:45 a.m. - 3:00 p.m., the volunteer will present the print to the judging panel, record the score on the label, and file the print in its proper location.

At our meeting on Wednesday, April 28, there will be sign-up rosters for those members who wish to participate. There is a need for twelve people for photo take-in (six each day), and nine people for the judging day. A short training session will be held 30 minutes before the work begins each day. Last year, the club added over a \$1,000 to the treasury which is a big help in funding club activities.

### **Member Profile: Tom Scott**

Tom O. Scott grew up surrounded by art, collected by generations of Scotts for over a hundred years. Until the summer of 2002, following a cruise to Alaska, he was convinced the only artistic bone in his body was in his eyeballs. Challenged by drawing a competent stick figure, unable to dance to the beat for more than thirty seconds, he suddenly realized the camera might provide



an ideal way to nurture the artistic embryo struggling to see the light.

The first months, lacking any knowledge of composition, f-stops, apertures, or depth of field, he snapped away with his newly acquired 3 megapixel digital camera with abandon. Out of the first 1,000 efforts, 2 or 3 looked promising. He took a workshop on composition and discovered the Rule of Thirds. That same year, he participated in online critique sites, such as PhotoPoints and PhotoSig. Soon after that, Tom found the North County Photographic Society, where he was inspired by the speakers and the immense talent of the membership.

Countless people there gave him advice and encouragement. The continuous feedback accelerated his learning curve, and soon he was ready to spend hundreds of dollars more on his first camera upgrade.

Moving from 3 megapixels to 5 megapixels opened up a new world. Tom learned that this was enough to create larger prints, so of course a good printer was the next necessity. Armed with an Epson 2200, and 70 ink cartridges, he set out to stun the world with his printing abilities. Sixty cartridges later, he finally managed to eliminate the magenta cast, change the Photo Black to Matte Black before printing on matte paper, and managed to replicate colors fairly faithfully. Of course, the matching could not be accomplished without the help of a Spyder to calibrate the monitor, along with Color Profiling software!

By now, you must think Tom is a true photographer geek. True enough. He has been a software engineer for 25 years, starting in the days when 8K was a lot of memory and "floppies" truly were floppy, measuring 8" x 8". He still applies his geek-abilities to databases in the non-photographic world, as well as to web sites, such as his own site at **www.tomoscott.com** and our NCPS site, **www.nc-photo.org**.

This year, aching to spend more dollars on another upgrade, he had his mind set on the new, relatively affordable Canon DSLR. But a salesman showed him a Mamiya 7ii medium format camera, and he went with that instead. So, while the entire world is moving from film to digital, Scott is going in reverse -- typical!

Last year, Tom entered the San Diego County Fair and even won a ribbon or two. Astounded and encouraged, he joined the San Diego Art Institute, where he has had several works accepted and the San Diego Art Guild (Offtrack Gallery), where he exhibits regularly. Last December, the Ordover Gallery in Solana



Beach invited him to be part of a group exhibit, and this March, he had his first solo show at the Encinitas City Hall.

### Digital Imagination Group, by Jim Respess

Five years ago, four or five members of the North County Photographic Society decided to hold special interest meetings on digital imaging. The Digital Imaging Group (DIG) met monthly in homes and offices whereever we could find space. Eventually we landed at the 101 Artist's Colony in Encinitas, and we have been there for the past three years as "Digital Imagination". In the mean time, the group has grown to

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almost 200 members with more than 80 members showing up at popular presentations. It has been a good run and there is no lack of enthusiasm, but after five years, I need a little break. I thank everyone for their support, contributions and energy. I will keep the announcement list together and will try to keep everyone informed about things digital around the County.

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
