Roy Taft Returns – The Bears of Katmai



Note from the Programs Director: Because I think we can all agree he has been one of our most outstanding speakers, I am happy to announce that Roy Toft will be returning as our June presenter. He last entertained us (in August of 2006) with fantastic images from his many Costa Rica trips, educating us not only with great photographic techniques but also about the incredible natural elements of this region. This time, we'll be practically on the other end of the continent with him, in Alaska! So come see some fantastic imagery and hear one of our most dynamic speakers share how he gets his exceptional photographs under challenging conditions (Have you ever tried bear photography in AK?? I have! Weather, water, high contrast, monochromatic elements,... But do you notice those things when you look at his photos?! No!)

From Roy Toft: Whenever I'm in Alaska (which is every summer), I'm struck by its immensity and vastness. With this presentation, I will recount my annual journey to view Bears in Alaska, from Pack Creek on Admiralty Island in Southeast Alaska, to the famous Denali and Katmai

National Parks. A single trip can take the photographer from the lush Temperate Rainforest in the southeast to the sparse treeless Tundra of central Denali National Park, and then on to witness the "spectacle of Brown Bears" in Katmai National Park. To conclude my Alaskan journey each year, I lead a group of photographers through my annual "Camping with Bears" workshop at Brooks Falls. Brooks Falls is one of two places in Katmai National Park (along with McNeil River) that are best known for its fishing bears. Last year, at one point we could see 25 different bears at one time! As always, our days are filled with photographing, watching, encountering, experiencing, and appreciating these amazing giants. Trips like this always remind me how lucky I am to be a wildlife photographer, and how amazingly diverse our planet is. I am also reminded how fragile the world's wild places are, and how we all need to remain vigilant in our advocacy for their protection.



About Roy Toft: Dedicated to documenting our natural world for future generations, professional photographer Roy Toft is an accomplished conservation photographer. With a background in wildlife and conservation biology, Toft chooses to focus solely on wild images that convey a sense of the animal's character and spirit. His images have



been featured in *National Geographic*, *Smithsonian*, *Audubon*, *Wildlife Conservation*, *Discover* magazines and other notable publications to advance conservation

efforts globally. As a result, he has been named a founding fellow of the prestigious *International League of Conservation Photographers (ILCP)*. Toft's striking wildlife images are also available worldwide through the *National Geographic Image Collection* and *Getty Images*. Roy shares his love for teaching & photography by regularly instructing photographic classes, tour groups and workshops in the field. Roy's popular *Rainforests of Costa Rica workshop* was recently filmed for television. The show, *Fine Living Network's Fantasy Camp*, has appeared on T.V. and airline flights. His home office is in the scenic mountainous region of beautiful north county San Diego.

PRESIDENTS CORNER by Stan John

By the time you read this, the San Diego Fair will have opened. NCPS members volunteered about 39 days of service to the International Photography Exhibition, Digital Arts, Journalism, and the Student Photography Exhibition. This breaks down to 8 days each for the two days of 'take-in', 10 days in support of the 'judging', and 4 days assisting with the return of images. For the Student Exhibition, we provided 9 judges. There were approximately 4100 images registered for the International Exhibit and all but about 500 were delivered on the two take-in days. This resulted in 3600 images being judged for the International, Digital Arts, and Journalism sections. Of these, 35% are hanging in the exhibition hall including 1120 in International Exhibition, 134 in Digital Arts, and 29 in Journalism. For the Student Exhibition 1850 images entered were judged, and are hanging.

The judging process for all the exhibitions is very similar, but the awarding of ribbons is quite different. In each exhibition two, or sometimes three, judges were assigned to each image class. While assistants, including NCPS members, held the images, one at a time, before the judges, each judge assigned a score to the image. The sums of the 2 or 3 judges' scores were then recorded on the image tag. For all but the Student contest, the score was also recorded in a logbook.

For the International, Digital Arts, and Journalism categories one 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th prize ribbon was given to the top four of the highest scoring images in each class. Next all of the 1st place winners from all of the classes were set up on a table so that all of the judges could view them and vote for their choice for the 'Best of Show' ribbon. This method is called the American System.

For the Student Exhibition ribbons were awarded based on the total point score for each image in each class. For two judges the total could be between 0 and 10. Images receiving 9 or 10 points were awarded 1st prize ribbons. 7 – 8 points rec'd 2nd, 5 – 6 rec'd 3rd, 3 – 4 rec'd 4th, 1 – 2 rec'd Honorable Mention. Once this was done for each class, all of the 1st place images in a Division were set out on a table and all of the judges cast their vote for 'Best of Division'. This method is called the Danish System.

Once again, NCPS members' participation in the San Diego County Fair contributed significantly to this event.

MEMBER SHARE by Barbara Swanson

This month's membershare topic is "Emotional Response". Please bring up to two images to share.

Often the most effective photographs are those that evoke an emotional response in the viewer. Instead of the picture being just purely representational, it has a deeper meaning as well. Examples of an emotional response could be nostalgia, joy, serenity or loneliness. Think about how you could make a photograph that expresses one of these emotions. For nostalgia, maybe objects that were your grandmother but aren't commonly used today might be successful. Joy could be represented by a child's face when he or she sees something wonderful. A peaceful nature scene may represent serenity. Is it easier for you to find a scene and then photograph it to represent the emotion, or to think of an emotion and then try to go out and photograph it? Both ways can work if you try.

July will be another all-meeting member critique session. We will have two people leading the critique, and it will be very similar to the one we had earlier this year. Please email or bring two photos, and rank them as 1 and 2 in case we cannot get to all of the images. Any topics are allowed. Digital submissions are strongly encouraged so that everyone (even in the back) can clearly see the images. The complete details will be in the next newsletter.

Photography has always been a great part of my life – as a young boy in Indiana with a Brownie camera, I dreamed of becoming a photographer.

I was drawn to the visual arts growing up. I was inspired by watching my father apply his artistic skills to his paintings, drawings and sculptures. But for me it was the art of photography that captured my imagination. Oh sure, I had youthful fantasies of being a policeman, or fireman but I also wanted to be a photographer. My father encouraged my dream by clearing a small space in his work shop for a dark room. Since then, I have traveled in over 33 countries, lived in Bolivia and El Salvador, experiencing new cultures and developing an appreciation for that which we would consider different.



I once read the following quote: “Great dancers aren’t great because of their technique; they are great because of

their passion.” My profound passion for photography has led me to pursue my life-long dream of being a photographer. I love the liberty of wedding photography, the quietness of architectural photography, the creativity of fine art, the problem-solving of commercial and product imagery, and any thing else which provides a challenge. I opened a studio this year in Carlsbad and have been blessed with new work and opportunities.

My quest to better myself in my chosen field is never ending; always learning and striving to be the best is my goal. This year I was honored to win the Professional Photographer’s of California “Photographer of the Year” in Wedding-Photojournalism for my entry of a child “dance-out” at the end of a long day.

Follow your dreams with passion. In the end, it is all that matters.

Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, Huntington Beach
San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, Irvine

Date: Saturday, June 23, 2007

Time: 9 am – 3 pm

Meet: Park & Ride, I-5 (east side) and La Costa Ave. (north side), in Carlsbad

This will primarily be a bird Photo Shoot, but there are also plenty of landscape opportunities. We will meet at the Park & Ride at La Costa Ave in Carlsbad at 9 am and drive north to the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary in Irvine (Thomas Guide 859, J7 phone (949) 261-7963.

Directions:

www.seaandsageaudubon.org/birdinfoparksoc.htm . This will be our first stop, and is considered one of the best birding locations in Southern California. There are ponds which can be accessed by 10 miles of carefully graded trails. They have built boxes for the tree swallows at this time of year, and it is a lot of fun photographing the parents bringing insects to the chicks. Other species which we may see at this time are black-necked stilts, avocets, herons, egrets, terns and ducks.

We will stay approximately an hour or so, depending on what is there, and then drive up the I-405, taking the Warner exit to the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve (Thomas guide 857, D4) (714 840-1575, located at 3842 Warner Ave. in Huntington Beach, on the inland side of Pacific Coast Highway at the only signal between Seapoint Ave. and Warner in Huntington Beach. This is also considered one of the best birding locations in Southern California. They have recently undergone an extensive 100M renovation, building a new bridge and trail, and opened up a very large new space for the birds, which unfortunately is not for people. In the past, there has always been a good opportunity for close-up shots, and flight shots of Terns and Black Skimmers with fish. I will try to scout it out the week before so we will have a good idea of what species are there. Again, usually there are black-necked stilts, avocets, herons, egrets, ducks etc.

There are toilet facilities at both areas. You should bring a lunch, water, sunscreen, sun glasses, hat, and good walking shoes. On the way home, if there is an interest we could stop by the Upper Newport Bay Ecological Reserve which is on our way. There is a platform where a pair of Ospreys, built a nest and had two chicks last year, and I will find out if they returned this year.

I use a 300MM lens, with a 1.4 teleconverter. Just bring the longest lens that you have, and that you are comfortable with. In both places, there are opportunities to get fairly close. 
