Bob Bretell – Flower & Studio Still Light

Commercial and fine art photographer Bob Bretell will be sharing traditional and experimental techniques he uses in the studio to create dramatic still



life photographs. Bob has been a professional photographer for 23 years and the focus of his work has been devoted to the plant and flower industry. In this presentation Bob will show examples of his personal work and break down the process he uses to achieve dramatic lighting "Painting with Light"

effects, including his "Painting with Light" technique. Many of his "*painted*" images have a stunning resemblance to old Masters paintings. Bob explains "I have always had a love and appreciation

for 17th century still life painting. What I am doing is of more а modern dav adaptation of that style using this unique digital process". Don't miss this

Bob Bretell, is a San Diego based photographer specializing in Food, Flowers and People. His amiable sense of humor and collaborative nature have helped build enduring relationships with clients such as the Paul Ecke Ranch, Pro Flowers, Bronners Soap and

San Tropez Bistro & Bakery. He is distinguished by his attention to detail and his dramatic lighting style which he incorporates into his fine art and commercial work.



After graduating with a degree in Commercial Photography in 1979, Bob served as staff photographer for Northern Virginia College for four years. After moving to California in 1983, he opened 2^{nd} St Photography where he became established as a portrait and wedding specialist, eventually shifting his direction to commercial work. Today Bob balances the demands of running a photography business with the challenges of helping raise a "pre-teen" daughter, a high maintenance cocker spaniel, a tweaked cat and two rats. Fortunately Bob is a dedicated Yogi. Bob has taught photography workshops at UCSD, Palomar and Mira Costa Colleges. MEMBER SHARE by Barbara Swanson

The membershare topic for March is "Portraits". Please send up to two images to share. As a reminder, all images must be to our projectionist by 6:30PM on the day before the meeting.

Portraits are a wonderful way to express something

about a person, and have been a favorite subject of painters and photographers for this reason. Much can be learned about portraiture by looking at paintings; many of the artists were masters of lighting, mood and posing, and these same techniques translate into photography. I always think of Rembrandt when I think of portraits; his way of lighting his subject is still amazing centuries after the portraits were painted.

Good portraiture is dependent on a number of factors. Good lighting is important. Usually this means soft lighting, such as near a window or in the shade with bright indirect light. Harsh lighting, such as mid-day sun, is usually not complementary to your subject. The eyes should almost always be in focus; if they are not, the portrait rarely works. Small catch lights in the eyes are often desirable. The expression on the face can say so much about the person, so work with your subject to make him/her feel comfortable and at ease. Have confidence in your ability to photograph people! Many people are shy about photographing others, especially strangers, but really you are complimenting them by wanting to photograph them. Have fun!

If you are doing street photography and someone really doesn't want to be photographed, respect that and move on. You most likely will get better photos from a willing subject. You can also position yourself to photograph people as they walk by; pick out a good background and wait for the people to move through it. Outdoor markets and street fairs are good places to photograph, as there are generally many people with colorful surroundings. Often one side of a street has better lighting than the other side. Beaches are also good places to photograph strangers.

Portraits can be effective as just a face shot or the whole person. Groups of people are also fun to do. I always take multiple shots with groups, as often someone is blinking or looking away. Of course, the more time you have, the more you can experiment and the probability you will make a really good photograph goes up.

The April topic is "Pets and Animals". Many of the same techniques that work for people also work for pets (and pets can be bribed with food!).

PRESIDENTS CORNER by Stan John

At our last meeting we held a Critique Session led by Kevin Connors and James Phenice. Their comments were along the lines I mentioned in last months President's Corner and were very informative to all members present. In addition to the issues we have discussed previously, they pointed out the importance of ensuring the eyes of people and animals are tack sharp and contain a highlight. In addition, it was pointed out that vacant areas should be guarded against. This is an important point and one that is often difficult to attain. Kevin and James' comments were very well received and will be of considerable aid to all of us in selecting and preparing our images for entry in the San Diego Fair.

The NCPS is a member of the Photographic Society of America (PSA) and they have put out a call to all member clubs to join in their Print Competition. I admit that I haven't deciphered all of the schedules and rules of this competition, but I can tell you it includes categories for commercially printed images as well as photographer printed images. There are four major categories and we can submit four images in each category, for a total of sixteen images. I believe the first submissions are to be in October of this year. All images are to be submitted in print form, and may be any size, up to 16 X 20. They do not encourage mounting and do not permit frames.

We need a volunteer to manage this activity and others to participate. Collection and selection activities need to be planned and run. Please contact me if you are willing to participate in this activity. As with all NCPS activities, nothing can take place without volunteer leaders.

We left for Mammoth Mountain on Sun, 3/1, thinking there might be some good photo opportunities along the way. Rumor said the wild flowers were ready to come out and should be worth the trip. Reality presented itself along the way, but not a single wild flower was to be found. Perhaps by the time you read this they may have begun to blossom.

Since arriving in Mammoth it has been snowing nonstop. We have had at least 30 inches of fresh powder in the last two and half days (today is Wed. 3/4) and

the winds have been fierce. My friends have been out skiing but it's not for a beginner like me.

I have looked for photo opportunities but the weather has not cooperated. For much of the time you could not see more than a few hundred feet and the rest of the time it was really bad. The light is 'flat' from sunup until sundown. So, landscape photography is out of the question. Now I'm thinking about trying to 'get in close' to find some photo opportunities. The weather service has promised tomorrow will be partly cloudy with moderate winds. Perhaps I'll be able to find some interesting things to photograph.

But, on the other hand, it may be a great ski day. YES!

Continue past Lawrence Welk Village to the Deer Park Winery

Inside the Winery building is a display of '50's cars, including the world's best restored "triple black" 1953 Cadillac Eldorado. The total collection includes over 130 autos. However, they are doing a lot of work on



the place, so it's uncertain exactly how many will be on display. The Winery Building houses some of the most fabulous wonders in Auto-

motive History. They have also have collected, restored and installed a spectacular collection of neon signs from all the dealers of the era: Buick, Cadillac, Ford, Oldsmobile and more. From the "Projectionist"—

We have had great fun with our new projector at recent meetings. NCPS is now projecting all club images in state-of-the-art digital format. Much expense & effort has been expended to assure that your images will be displayed by a calibrated and accurately profiled system.

To get the most out of this system, each member must do their part in processing and preparation of their images. To help, we have prepared the following steps to guide in your submission and preparation.

Image submission and preparation for "member share" and "photo shoot" reports.

PLEASE FOLLOW THESE GUIDELINES FOR DISPLAY OF YOUR IMAGES AT OUR MONTHLY MEETINGS (This does not apply to our website Gallery images, which has separate requirements).

We currently have a calibrated/profiled system that will accurately project your image settings. To be sure that your images match what you see on your monitor, you too should have a calibrated monitor with your computer.

SUBMISSION

Each member is encouraged to submit up to two images for "member share". These will be viewed and constructively commented on by the attending members or judges.

Each member, who has participated in a "club photo shoot", may also contribute their favorite photos for the "photo shoot" section of our monthly meeting. These photos will be shown, without comment by the attending members, and on a "as time permits" basis. Please give us your journalistic or fine art view of the photo shoot. This is your chance to show us what went on and what the photographic results were.

All images are to be emailed to the club "projectionist", no later than 6:30 PM the night before our meeting. Due to time constraints, there will not be any images added the evening of the meeting.

PREPARATION STEPS

- 1. Edit your photo in your favorite software application. There are no restrictions on digital darkroom technique.
- 2. Save the original high resolution image in your normal workflow procedure.
- 3. Using a duplicate image, do the following:
 - a. Set to 72 dpi
 - b. Size to fit the projector; 1024 max. width X 768 max. height. All images must fit within this box size. Be certain that the width pixels and height pixels do not exceed either of these dimensions, e.g. landscape images should not exceed 1024 pixels wide X 768 pixels high, and portrait images should not exceed 768 pixels high.
 - color profile to c Set the sRGB IEC61966-2.1.
 - d. Set sharpening and contrast as needed for this reduced resolution.
 - "save as" jpeg at the highest quality sete. ting & file name with your first and last name; #1 or #2. e.g. JohnDoe#1.jpg JohnDoe#2.jpg
 - f. Check your image prior to submission, to confirm your settings.
- 4. This procedure will result in an image not larger than 500-1.000 kb.
- 5. E-mail to projectionist@nc-photo.org
- 6. You should receive an e-mail reply confirming your submission, as soon as the projectionist opens the file.

Any questions can be directed to #5 above.

Member Profile – Ron Nash

My first memories of using a camera are from around 1964 when my parents gave me a Kodak Instamatic 100 camera. I was 7 at the time and thoroughly enjoyed taking pictures of gooney birds (the local name of the Laysan Albatross) and other sights on Midway Island. My father was stationed at the Naval Station for 3 years and our family was fortunate to be with him on Midway Island. Midway is way out in the middle of the Pacific Ocean, about halfway between Hawaii and Guam. The Midway Island Naval Station was closed in 1993 and Midway is now a National Wildlife Refuge.

Later in junior high I took a class in black and white photography. I had a year of timers, safe lights, developers, fixers and enlargers as we learned how to



develop our own black and white negatives and prints.

My interest in photography waned and laid dormant until after college. Around 1981 I took an Adult Education class in photography and bought my first SLR. Later in 1982 I joined the Photo Arts Camera Club in Balboa Park. T learned a lot about photography, slide

composition and color from the friendly folks in the club. For a while I was the club's newsletter editor,

pounding out each edition on an old manual typewriter!

Over the years I've dabbled with various cameras. For a brief time I used a large format Crown Graphix 4X5 camera. Ah! The joys of dark slides and changing bags! I have a small pile of 4X5 slides and negatives I should digitize before they fade. About 3 years ago I bought a Sony H1 5mp digital camera. The quality of the images convinced me to switch to digital photography. Oddly enough I find the dynamic range of the Sony almost identical to the old Kodachrome slides I used to shoot.

A few years ago I joined our club and have been editing the Lens Paper for a bit over a year now.
