the Lens Paper PRESIDENTS CORNER by Stan John

The San Diego Country Fair opens June 12th and will run thru July 5 (Closed June 15th & 22nd). NCPS members volunteered for many days of service to the International Photography Exhibition, Digital Arts, Journalism, and the Student Photography Exhibition. Ed Stalder coordinated the NCPS volunteers again this year. For the Student exhibition several members served as judges.

There were approximately 3,300 images registered for the International Exhibit and all but a few were delivered on the two take-in days. This resulted in nearly 3,300 images being judged for the International, Digital Arts, and Journalism sections. Of these, approximately one third are hanging in the exhibition. For the Student Exhibition each student is allowed to enter 2 and approx 2,400 images were entered, judged, and are hanging. In this exhibit, all entries are hung.

The judging process for all the exhibitions is similar, but the awarding of ribbons is quite different. In the past, for each of the exhibitions, three judges were assigned to each image class. While assistants, including NCPS members, held the images, one at a time, before them, each judge assigned a score from 1 to 5 to the image. The sums of the 3 judges' scores were then recorded on the image tag. For all but the Student contest, the score was also recorded in a logbook. This year the judging process was changed for all but the Student Exhibition. Instead of each judge giving a score from 1 to 5 they were only allowed to 'accept' or 'reject'.

This resulted in a total score of from 0 to 3. If any one of the judges thought the image was exceptional, the score was raised to 3+. Only those with a score of 3 or 3+ were to be hung. Since approximately one third of all the images were to be hung, a count of the 3 and 3+ groups was made and an adjustment was made, by the judges, by either reducing the number of those in the 3 group, downgrading a few to level 2, or increasing the quantity in group 3 by selecting the best of group 2 and upgrading their score. The judges then laid the 3+ images out on a table and selected the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th prizewinners. Then the judges

selected the Honorable Mention images from within the 3 and 3+ groups.

As I see it, this method of scoring has the drawback of not providing the artist with any feedback on his/her level of achievement. The new approach was supposed to save time, but in fact it did not. I hope they will return to a full scoring system next year. The new practice of letting the 'judges' move images from a lower scoring group to a higher group was beneficial. The old process was to let the exhibition administrators adjust the number of images to be hung by selecting an entire score group to be hung or not hung. Letting the judges selectively review and adjust the 'to be hung' group is a definite improvement.

All of the 1st place winners from all of the classes were set up on a table so the judges could view them and vote for their choice for the 'Best of Show' ribbon.

For the Student Exhibition ribbons were awarded based on the total point score for each image in each class. For three judges the total could be between 3 and 15. Images receiving 13 to 15 points were awarded 1st prize ribbons. 10 – 12 points rec'd 2nd, 9 – 11 rec'd 3rd, 6 - 8 rec'd 4th, 3 - 5 rec'd Honorable Mention. Then all of the 1st place images for a class were placed on a table and the judges for that class selected the 'Best of Class'. Once this was done for all of the classes, all of the 'Best of Class' images in a Division were set out on a table and all of the judge's cast their vote for 'Best of Show'. This method is called the Danish System

Once again, NCPS members' participation in the San Diego County Fair contributed significantly to this event.

July 30-Aug 5 Photography Retreat with Donna Cosentino in the Bristlecone Pines

Stay at Crooked Creek Station in a lovely valley near Patriarch Grove. We'll meet and then spend the night in Lone Pine, California on the 30th and photograph in the famous Alabama Hills and at the Whitney Portal waterfall. The stay in the Bristlecone Forest begins the 31st. The Bristlecone Forest is located in the White Mountain Range opposite the Sierras on the eastern side of the Owens Valley. We'll take the first day to acclimate (we'll be at over 10,000 feet) and photograph around the facility and in the nearby pine and then spend the next few days photographing in the Schulman and Patriarch Groves. Crooked Creek is a University of California research facility and we will be taking our meals with scientists and students from all over the country who study the Flora and Fauna of this very special location. Of course, the main attraction for us are the elegant and mystical Bristlecone Pines some of which are over 4,000 years old.

This is a true retreat with time to create, study and renew your spirit. It is beautiful and exceedingly peaceful. There's much more to tell you about...image share, shooting moonrise in the Patriarch Grove...and I give you a full itinerary with info and lots of prep suggestions. I have reserved this time at Crooked Creek but I do need to know if I have the number of folks to make this a go. Some nice folks are already signed up so it will be a good time for being with people who are passionate about photography. If you are interested please think about it and email me right away to let me know. The price is \$795 which includes our four-night stay at Crooked Creek (\$105 per night, bed and meals) plus my workshop fee.
