Larry Vogel: Fine Art Photography


Larry Vogel will cover his use of working with individual projects as a creative format for approaching his fine art photography. In addition he will introduce the group to his approach of site-specific corporate art installations.

He began his career as a fine art photographer heavily influenced by his mentor Ansel Adams; he believed he would spend his life wandering the meadows and valleys of the national parks photographing black and white landscape images with a 4x5 view camera. Later he discovered the profound benefits of approaching his work within the format of individual projects. With this new approach he has found endless creative possibilities. Now, each new body of work

has a beginning, a middle, and an end. You will see how this approach has helped Larry establish himself as an artist with an extreme diversity. A favorite quote picked up years ago from another self-proclaimed diverse artist is, "My diversity may become my claim to obscurity." To that Larry says, he will gladly give up the notoriety in favor of a more creative life that comes with his diversity.

Larry Vogel has been involved in photography for over thirty years and in recent times has started using several mediums to express his creative explorations, including, photography, ceramics, Vogel has exhibited his work since 1979 and has been included in more than fifty exhibitions, including The Ansel Adams Gallery in Yosemite, California, and the Africus, Johannesburg Biennale in 1997.

Larry was awarded a photographic scholarship from

The Friends of Photography for the Ansel Adams Photography Workshops in 1983, which Vogel says he was fortunate to be able to attend, as it was the last of the workshops that the renowned photographer, Ansel Adams, was alive to teach.



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Larry continues to evolve as a creative artist and has created several bodies of work,

some traditional in concept and technique, some experimental and abstract. Vogel continues his artistic evolution as he enters into the digital age.

Vogel has over 25 years experience teaching workshops. He has directed The Photographers' Exchange for 20 years. The group has held monthly meetings which provides a platform for fine art photographers to show and receive critiques of their work. Vogel has been an exhibiting fine art photographer for more than 30 years. He is currently represented by the Susan Spiritus Gallery, Newport Beach, CA, Wild Heart Gallery, Carmel Valley, CA, and Preston Contemporary Art, Mesilla, New Mexico.

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PRESIDENTS CORNER by Barbara Swanson

Spring is approaching and that means it is time to consider entering the photography competition at the San Diego Fair. There are some changes this year, so don't wait until the last minute to look over the information on their website. One big change is that the initial submissions will be electronic. Follow their guidelines, and optimize your pictures for electronic viewing. One benefit is that you won't be printing and matting photos that are not accepted for the show, which saves time and money.

I believe that some of the categories are different, so take a look now and start going through your photos. While photography judging can be very subjective, a few guidelines do help. Photos should be technically correct (exposure, sharpness). Ones that evoke an emotion or a response in the viewer are often strong images. Unique subjects or viewpoints stand out. Tell a story.

Hopefully the critique session at our February meeting was helpful in assessing your photos. Often it helps to get the opinions of others, as they may have a different perspective.

March Member Share: Contre Jour

The French term contre-jour (against daylight) refers to images taken with the subject positioned directly between camera and light source, producing a very dramatic effect. Basically, we are pointing the camera directly into the sun (or a light), doing exactly what every beginner in photography has been told to avoid. Yet the contrast between light and shadow can produce stark and captivating photographs. The strong backlighting silhouettes the subject and emphasizes lines and shapes while minimizing details. The light source can appear as a strong glare behind the subject or create a soft, halo-like light around the darker silhouette. Glare adds dramatic impact to the image but the photographer can control and choose to minimize it by using lens-hoods or by placing the subject appropriately. If desired, strong contrast can be reduced by using fill-light, such as flash or reflected light.

Photographing subjects against the sun is a very common way to produce a contre-jour effect, but one can also use windows, tunnels, or lamps to frame and illuminate a subject from behind. As with any creative endeavor the possibilities are nearly limitless, and I am looking forward to seeing your interpretations of contre-jour.
