the Lens Paper JUDGES NOTES by Sandy Zelasko

This year's Members' Show consisted of 91 entries in eight categories. Everyone did a great job following the entry rules and delivering their images on time. Judging took just under two hours and afterwards our judges, Larry Vogel and Robert Turner sat down with us to discuss the process and what they look for when awarding ribbons.

"Capture the image protecting the highlights," Turner emphasized. Technical details played a large part in their decision. Check your histogram! Make sure you are not clipping the highlights. They were very passionate about presentation and technical details of the final prints.

Both judges concurred that a clean, detailed presentation (mounting, framing and matting) increases your chances to place in a competition. They suggested dry mounting your images to eliminate print warping; be careful when your presentation of choice is mounting on foam core only; choose the correct color to help achieve a finished look.

"People are learning to process their images better and that brings it up a lot," Vogel commented referring to post-processing techniques. There are several software programs that offer tools to do just that. *Photoshop*, *Lightroom*, *Aperture*, *PS Elements* and others are available to attain better contrast, sharpening and saturation. A little goes a long way. There are many free webinars available that cover basic to advanced editing suggestions.

Both Vogel and Turner preferred to see a couple images printed larger and both agreed that using a vignette to help the viewer's eye focus on your subject matter would have improved some of the entries.

In general and referring to subject matter that has been "done to death," Vogel advises "you better make sure what you are doing is different. Really have a good version of it." "If you want to make a statement, try doing something that hasn't been done," Turner added.

Thank you to our dedicated judges who also offer seminars and workshops to help you improve your photography.

Overall, it is great to see all the participation in our annual show. One last quote that resonated with me and which I would like to share came from Vogel before we parted. "Performance of the image means everything."

Accessing Member Pages on the NCPS website

7hy Are We Doing This?

Easier member share, both for members and volunteers

Keep your mailing address accurate and up-to-date

Makes it easier than ever to participate!

How to Log In

It's easy to access your private membership login on the club website. Here's how: go to http://nc-photo.org and click the red Members Login button at the top of the page. If this is your first time here, simply enter your email address and the last 7 digits of your phone number, including the dash. If you would like your browser to remember your password for you, click the "Remember me" button.

Change font size

If you would like to see larger text onscreen, click the large "A" to make text bigger...and click the small "A" to make it smaller. Click login to proceed.

What to do if you can't get in

The website will give you instructions if your login doesn't work the first time; it reminds you that you need to type the dash in your phone number, and provides an email address to get additional help if that doesn't work.

What You Can Do

Notice tabs across the top to access each feature

Now let's see what you can do once you've logged in. Click each of the tabs across the top of the screen to see each feature: Contact Information, Galleries, Suggestion Box Member Share

Update contact info

Let's go back to the first tab to look at your contact information. First, it's a good idea to change your password in order to make your account more secure; because your password starts out as your phone number, it's a little too easy to guess. Notice the website tells you this when you first log in.

Next, update your mailing address and fix any typographical errors.

You may choose to "Go Green" — by unchecking the "Mail newsletter via USPS" which tells the club not to send you a newsletter in the mail, and clicking "Email newsletter", which tells the club to email the monthly newsletter. If you would rather not receive any communications from the club at all, uncheck both boxes.

Now click "Save" to save your changes.

Easily send photos to projectionist for member share

Now let's see how easy it is to send photos in for member share. First, click the Member Share tab at the top of the screen. Once there, you'll see a short description of the month's member share topic, and two buttons for uploading your photos.

Click "Upload Photo #1" and choose the image file that you would like to share. Then, click "Select" to proceed. Once your photo finishes uploading, the web site automatically resizes it to the proper size for projection, and tells you what size it changed it to. Click "OK" and you're done! Only JPEG photos are allowed.

Create and manage online galleries

Now let's create a photo gallery on the club website. You may have seen other members' galleries and wanted to create your own. Now it's easy to create and manage your <u>own</u> gallery!

Click the galleries tab to get started. You can write a short biography that will appean on the club website...if you would like your email address to be visible to the world in your gallery, click the "Reveal email address in galleries" checkbox, otherwise your email will remain private.

Now let's create your first gallery. Start by clicking the "Create Gallery" button on the lower-left corner of the screen, and then type a name for your gallery.

Now let's add a photo to your gallery. Click "Upload new Image" and choose a photo from your computer's hard disk. The software automatically scales your photo to the appropriate size, and even knows what year you took the photo so it can make a copyright notice. Just type a short description and you're done! If you make a mistake, it's easy to correct; simply click to edit your photo descriptions.

Have you noticed how each member's gallery on the website has a key photo next to their name and biography? Here's how you pick one of your own photos to be your gallery key photo: select the photo, and click the "Make Key Photo" button.

Now let's see how your gallery is shaping up on the web site. Click "Visit this gallery on the web site" to see how the rest of the world will see your gallery. You may click the up-arrow to go up one level to see your categories, and then go up another level to see everyone else's galleries. Notice your key photo in the top-level gallery, as well as your mini-biography.
