Guest Speaker: Roy Toft Wednesday, Oct. 23 @ 6:30pm*

Roy Toft's photographic career started with getting his first SLR camera as a college graduation present in 1986. Two days after getting that first



camera (Canon AE1), Roy was in Alaska working as a biologist on a wolf population study for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. Over the next ten years, Roy's day jobs included bird trainer & educator,

naturalist, elementary school teacher, natural history museum curator and photography assistant to National Geographic photographer Michael "Nick" Nichols.

Nature, conservation and education have always been Roy's passions and after turning to photography full time in 1993...Roy's work has focused on wild animals and their fragile environments. His publications include National Geographic, Smithsonian, Audubon, Discover, Wildlife Con-



servation, Ranger Rick, and other natural history magazines and publications worldwide. His work is primarily represented by the National

Geographic Image collection and Getty Images. Using photography as a conservation tool has always been important to Roy and in 2005 he became a founding fellow in the prestigious International League of Conservation Photographers. Along with making images, Roy has always enjoyed teaching people about nature and photography. His first photo workshop was taught 12 years ago in the Osa Peninsula, Costa Rica. Over the last decade, Roy has lead and taught workshops in Japan, Alaska, Africa, Brazil, Papua New Guinea, and Costa Rica.

Roy's first trip to Africa in 1991 was an overland safari to Botswana. The safari itself was a disaster, with broken down vehicles the entire way, horrible food, bucket baths, and pup-tent accommodations.....but the African bug had bit Roy and



since then he has led trips to Kenya, Tanzania, Rwanda, Namibia, South Africa, and Botswana. The last ten years have been devoted to leading trips for photogra-

phers to Botswana. Roy makes his home in the boulder-covered back country of Ramona, Ca. (30 miles north east of San Diego), with his wife Robin and their three Labrador Retrievers.

Focusing - my nemesis. This has been one of the hardest things for me to get right. Maybe that's why I have specialized in landscape pictures. Focusing is not really a problem when everything is far away. I just pick the composition, set up a tripod, put the f-stop on 22 and I can even use automatic focus.

However the last few weeks I've been using my new macro lens. Now focusing is all important. Yikes! This morning I was out in the very wet dewy grass taking pictures of dragon flies. And yesterday I was deep in Glacier Park crawling on the ground to get photos of mushrooms.

With my new macro lens my photographic world (and focusing) will require a whole new approach.

Editor's Note: Hey, colleagues! How about sending in your suggestions for better focusing techniques. I'll try to include some of your insightful responses in an upcoming newsletter for the members' benefit.



"Best of Nature"

A Photography Exhibition at San Diego's Ordover Gallery

A special 'Congratulations' goes out to NCPS members who earned a place in this juried show when their images were selected for exhibition by the judges. Members whose work was selected include Lew Abulafia (2), Mark Drawbridge (3), Wayne Richards (2), Rex Short (3), Ginna Short (1), Barbara Swanson (2), and Sandy Zelasko (3).

Special honors went to Mark Drawbridge (first place nature) and Sandy Zelasko (honorable mention). Following is a sample of some of their images and the stories behind them.

Rex Short

Blue Damselflies on Red Clover



"The image above was taken in our backyard in Montana with a Canon 180-mm macro lens, Canon 1Ds Mark IV, Tripod, cable release, 1/125 second, ISO 800, and here's the story: f/6.3 to control the background with 3 focus points blended for increased depth of field to maintain sharpness on both damselflies and a portion of the clover and leaves. It is always interesting that these creatures are aware of your presence and they sometimes react by moving. In this case I keep repositioning myself until they are in parallel planes, which adds to the overall sharpness and focus in the image. I did not use flash in this case as it sometimes distorts the colors on these highly reflective damselflies, but I did use some reflected light [gold reflector] to brighten the scene." - Rex

Barbara Swanson *Winter Wrestlers*



"It was our last morning in Yellowstone and there had been snowfall overnight. The bison came near our vehicle and were butting horns and fighting. I kept following the action out the window with my 80-400 mm lens, which let me adjust the zoom depending on how close the bison approached. I like this photo the best because of the eye contact between the two competitors and how it looks like the larger bull is going to push the other bull right out of the picture." - Barbara

Ginna Short Leopard Kill



"This leopard was run off the kill a few seconds after this photo was taken by wild dogs, which was another exciting photo opt." - Ginna

Nature's Art



"This image of an American Avocet feeding was made at San Elijo Lagoon in the late afternoon. It was taken from a low angle using a Canon 7D and 400mm f/5.6L lens. The linked, glistening drops of water coming from the bird as it sifts food from the water is what make the image unique (from the dozens of images I took of these birds feeding). To me it looks like diamonds coming from its bill, which is one of the reasons I gave it the title I did. I also like all the curves that are visible." - Mark

Sandy Zelasko Owlets



"I found these owlets on the grasslands located in the South Platte River basin during a recent photo workshop. On the last day shooting, after many of the attendees had already gone home, the remaining couple of photographers shot this pair of sibling great horned owlets in vivid golden light. I was very pleased with the images, just in time to hit the road. But the owlet's beauty tugged at me. I didn't want to leave and turned to take one last look. Bingo! The backlighting was breathtaking." - Sandy

Lew Abulafia

Lake Placid

"I was shooting in the Adirondack Mountains of upstate New York, several years ago in the fall, and came south to the town of Lake Placid. There were many small lakes, bogs and ponds in the area and I was hiking around late one afternoon and came across this group of trees across the lake. An earlier storm had stripped most of the trees of their leaves but some color remained. The wind stopped for a few minutes and I was able to get a beautiful reflection of the trees and fall color in the surface of the lake." - Lew



Wayne Richard Feast Before Winter



"After a week of photographing cuddly looking Brown Bears in Alaska they actually started to feel like family, but a 500mm lens was a safe and practical choice for por-

traits. For this image, I chose a tight crop to limit the viewers' attention to the eyes, muzzle, claws, and the salmon which I felt were the critical elements of the scene. The result is a poignant intimacy where the salmon has reached the end of its life cycle while the bear enjoys its final feast before winter hibernation ... and nature moves on." - Wayne **Congratulations** to Sandy Zelasko and her volunteer crew for carefully hanging our NCPS
