Michael Orenich "Mongolia" Wednesday, September 28 at 6:30 p.m.



Mongolia, with a total population of 2.9 million, is the least populated independent country in the world. The far eastern region, BayanOlgii, is 700 miles west of the capital Ulaanbaatar.

High, dry, rugged and raw, the isolated, oddly shaped province follows the arc of the Mongol Altai Nuruu Mountains as it rolls out of Central Asia towards the barren wastes of the Dzungarian Basin.

The people of this region are the Kazakh's. A nomadic ethnic group who live exclusively in the BayanOlgii region. Unlike the rest of Mongolia, which is dominated by the Khalkah Mongols which are Buddhist, the Kazakh's are



Sunni Muslim. There may be perhaps 100,000 people in the region.


The Kazakh's are nomadic herders of cattle, sheep, goats, yaks, horses or camels which roam the region two to three times a year, during the seasons, in search of grasses to survive.

Kazakhs trace their roots to the 15th century, when rebellious kinsmen of an Uzbek Kahn broke away, and settled in present day Kazakhstan. The last bastion of the eagle hunters and horsemanship sports of this culture.

There are an estimated 250 eagle hunters in the Western Mongolian province. Their practice is unique in that they only use trained Golden Eagles and are on horseback. Their hunting target is almost limited to Red Fox or Corsac Fox. In the last week of September, 70 eagle hunters gather for the annual Golden Eagle Festival in Sagsai.



Ed Stalder - "How Did You Get That Shot"



"Horsetail Fall, located in Yosemite National Park, is nature's answer to the old 'Fire Fall' from earlier days. To take a picture you will need, besides a camera, lots of luck, determination, and patience. The type of camera is not important but a tripod is recommended.

There are two sites from which the picture can be taken. Northside Drive at the picnic site west of Yosemite Lodge, and the base of El Capitan or Southside Drive west of the Chapel. The crowds at both locations will help you find the spot.

The light show occurs at approximately 5:30 p.m. during the last two weeks of February under very special conditions. First a good snow pack to produce lots of water, sun angle and height. You want unobstructed views to the west. No heavy cloud cover but broken clouds are OK.

As far as camera settings go, F11 works fine, a polarizer helps reduce specular highlights and setting the white balance to shade improves your image. For composition use a 28mm to 200mm lens. You will

have about 15 minutes to get your image before the light fails. Do not expect to get the picture you want on your first attempt unless you are very lucky. It took me four years to get this picture and it still is not what I would like. Mother Nature has lots of laughs at our expense."

On September 2, 2016, the Photographic Society of America (PSA) announced that my entry for their 2016 Photo Book Essay Contest won first place. The title of the photo book is: Terezin; "Small Fortress." The book showcases images which I took at the Terezin concentration camp in the Czech Republic last year. The stark black and white images also show a corresponding historical image on each facing page. I used "Mixbook" as the publisher which I learned about from Mike McMahon's class this year. There were seventeen entries from four countries in this competition. The book will be presented and shown at the PSA conference in San Antonio, Texas on September 10th.

As I walked through the Small Fortress at the Terezin WWII concentration camp, located in a small town in the former Czechoslovakia, I tried to absorb the horrible history of the prison reflected in the barren rooms and corridors laid out in front of me. I was gripped by the thought that thousands of human beings had passed through the very location I was walking upon; some were tortured, others starved, and still others met their sudden demise at the hands of the cruel and inhuman Nazis. I tried to envision but for a moment what it must have been like to be stuffed in such small environs with others who were sick, hungry, cold and ill clothed. My mind didn't let me linger. I pressed the shutter and moved on looking for something unique to remember, yet honor those who suffered great inhumanity. That is why I made the photo essay book of some of my images; to remember and not forget the nameless ones.
