President's Corner 'Self-Critique'

I don't claim to be the most knowledgeable about critiquing photography but I do have some experience under my belt. I'll be judging the San Diego Fair International Photography Exhibition for the fourth time this year, have been a judge for Abe Ordover's Best of Nature Show at the NAT, sat on multiple panels of judges for various online competitions, acted as a solo judge for many art guilds and continue to share my interpretation at local camera clubs and for PSA contests. By doing so, not only do I contribute a point of view to help other artists, but I continue to develop an eye for what makes a winning composition.



So here are a few tips about what I have learned which may help you develop a better eye and further your photographic success. Remember, critiques should focus on factually based characteristics. For example, is the important part of your subject in focus (factual) as opposed to using a shallow depth of field which is an (artistic) choice.

Tools to help you edit/critique your own images-the sooner you learn to self-critique, the better your photography becomes. Here are some questions you should ask yourself when viewing each image:

- What do I like about this image? Find something positive. Yes, there is always something positive. Critique your artistic vision separate from the technical aspects of your image.
- What is the most important part of the image and what is the first thing that catches my eye? Are they the same? If not, make corrections and eliminate things that don't add to your story.
- Were the techniques I used successful? Is the image sharp where it needs to be? If not, move on and practice your focus techniques. Review how depth of field works with the equipment in your camera bag.
- Is the composition appealing? If not, crop! If possible, recompose. Make sure the visual weight of the image is balanced. Remember the rule of thirds. Use it and break it when appropriate.
- Are there distracting elements? If so, get rid of them. Either while taking the image or during post-processing (if rules allow).
- Do my eyes wander? Or do they stay focused in the image? Get rid of light/bright things or lines that pull you out of an image. Use a vignette. Burn the spot if you can. A little goes a long way.
- Is my image exposed correctly? Evaluate expose and adjust in post-processing. Use your histogram to help you determine whether you are over or under exposing.

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• Does my background compliment my subject? If your background is cluttered, reposition yourself. There is not much you can do to save a busy image after the fact. Look for a clean background before you take the shot.

• Is my image color balanced and do I want it to be? Make sure your colors are not off unless you are intentionally making a creative choice. Keep whites white and blacks black, the rest will fall into place, more or less.

• Last but not least, is my image cliché? If so, change your perspective until you find a unique view. Be different! Judges LOVE it.

Self-critiquing is a skill and skills improve over time with practice. Begin by being honest with yourself. Understand why you made the choice then give yourself a chance to develop. When you are ready to go further, enter a contest, take a workshop or join a photo club!

On June 23rd, I'll be leading a free workshop for the Valley Center Art Guild titled, "From a Judge's Point of View," hoping to share ideas to help photographers create successful images. I'll be suggesting small things that I would do differently and which could make a big difference to your end result.

Our most recent photo shoot was the first weekend of March at the Orange Empire Railroad Museum in Perris, CA. While dodging the rain, we came away with interesting shots of their swap meet, buildings, model trains, and real trains.

This is a photo of the 'underbelly' of the wooden railroad trestle that has crossed the San Elijo Lagoon in Cardiff for the past 60 years. Within the next few months, the trestle is scheduled to be demolished and replaced with a concrete structure as part of the railroad double-track project.

While, previously, it would have been impossible to photograph this aspect of the bridge without using some kind of boat or raft, I took advantage of the recent renovation activity to walk underneath and document the details of the trestle construction. After a number of attempts, I found that late afternoon sun, just before sunset, provided the best lighting. Using a 55-300 zoom lens, I set the ISO to 3200 with an f/22 aperture and 1/100 shutter speed.
